

SCALING UP COLLABORATIVE GOVERNANCE RESEARCH: NEW TOOLS AND DEVELOPMENTS

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Across the world, collaborative governance researchers are experimenting with new scaled-up techniques to collect more cases, conduct cross-country comparisons, and map collaborations. What are today's big questions in collaborative governance research? Why do we need to scale up to answer these questions? And what is lost in adopting these new methods?



Dr. Christopher Ansell is a Professor of Political Science at the University of California, Berkeley



Dr. Scott Douglas is an assistant Professor of Public Management at the Utrecht School of Governance. **The Collaborative Governance Case Database** recognizes the growing interest from practitioners and scholars in collaborative governance, but recognizes the study of collaborations is limited by the work required to collect high quality case studies. Therefore, the case database provides a free common pool resource for researchers to share high quality case studies, enabling them to share, collect, and analyze larger numbers of case studies.



Dr. Tina Nabatchi is the Joseph A. Strasser Endowed Professor in Public Administration at Syracuse University. **The Atlas of Collaboration** (the Atlas) project attends to conceptual and empirical limitations associated with case-studies by building a large-n database on collaborative governance that spans and connects multi-site, multi-level data on the structures, processes, inputs, outputs, and outcomes of collaborative governance regimes (CGRs), collaborative platforms, and collaborative systems.



Dr. Peter Triantafillou is a Professor of Public Policy and Performance Measurement at Roskilde University. **The TROPICO** is a cross-country comprehensive project examining the conditions, processes and effects of collaboration in the design and delivery of public services where multiple cases are adopted. Triantafillou's role in this project is to study the effects of collaborative governance in the field of long-term unemployment services for the accountability and legitimacy of these services.

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
